


Recognized for excellence in nursing

OUR SPECIALTIES

As a new APP or APP student, you may already know which unit you want to work in, or you may want to explore different units and specialties. Nebraska Medicine offers a wide range of clinical settings, and we are committed to helping you develop your skills and grow in a unit that aligns with your passion.

Each specialty brings a unique patient population and requires different skill sets. Learn what it takes to succeed as an APP and the kinds of patients and treatments you will experience.

Ambulatory Cardiology

Shifts: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. clinic rotation, Monday through Friday. Additional opportunities to rotate in the echo lab.

Locations: Nebraska Medical Center and Village Pointe Health Center.

Environment: Ambulatory/outpatient rotation only. Patients have a variety of cardiology conditions and can rotate through the noninvasive, invasive, electrophysiology and heart failure clinics.

Preceptors: Individual or team-based precepting.

Prerequisites: Family Medicine or

Internal Medicine rotation.

Appropriate NP Track: FNP or AGPCNP.

Cardiothoracic (CT) Surgery

Shifts: Four-week variable schedule, generally from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., with one weekend of call/rounding (8 a.m. to noon).

Additional opportunities: Participate in emergencies and organ procurements.

Location: Nebraska Medical Center, Omaha.

Preceptors: Many different physician assistant (PA) and nurse practitioner (NP) preceptors throughout rotation, depending on assignment (Cardiac Clinic, Cardiac Floor, Cardiac OR, Thoracic Clinic/OR)

Prerequisites: General Surgery rotation required.

Preferred experience: Cardiology rotation.

Critical Care Medicine

Shifts: 12-hour day and night shifts, including holidays and weekends. The APPs typically work two to five shifts in a row, depending on schedule and vacation needs.

Additional opportunities: Participate in emergencies and organ procurements.

Locations: Nebraska Medical Center and Bellevue Medical Center. Some APPs also cover Madonna Rehabilitation Specialty Hospital, providing pulmonary consults in the long-term acute care hospital (LTACH) and acute rehab units (Monday through Friday, day shift).

Environment: Inpatient only; no clinic or surgical/ OR time. We work closely with several specialties, including nephrology, GI, lung transplant, palliative care, neurocritical care and cardiology. Our patients are all medical ICU patients (shock, respiratory failure, DKA, overdose, pre-transplants, etc.).

Preceptors: May be individual or team-based precepting.

Prerequisites: Required inpatient clinical experience to write inpatient notes (H/Ps and progress notes), call consulting services and present patients on rounds to the attendings/fellows.

Preferred Experience: Students do not necessarily need ICU RN experience but it is a plus.

Endocrinology/DEM:

Shifts: Generally 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., variable schedule. Ideally completed within one month for the best learning experience. Additional learning opportunities with topic-focused MD lectures (if scheduled) and Mondays clinical conferences. Mostly outpatient clinic-based, but some opportunities for inpatient on request.

Locations: Nebraska Medical Center, Oakview Health Center, Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center – Nebraska Medical Center, Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center – Village Pointe Health Center, Olson Center for Women's Health.

Preceptors: PAs and APRNs will be assigned to one provider in each clinic.

Prerequisites: Required Internal Medicine/Family Medicine Primary Care rotation.

Helpful experience: Cardiology rotation; review of American Diabetes Association (ADA) Standards of Care in Diabetes (https://professional.diabetes.org/).

Expectations: Independently see patients, present cases to preceptor, formulate tentative A&P (with discussion and assistance) and complete progress notes.

Appropriate NP track: FNP, AGPCNP would focus in ambulatory. AGACNP would include more inpatient experiences.

Family Medicine:

Shifts: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Locations: Multiple locations across Omaha

(Bellevue, Nebraska Medical Center, Elkhorn, Millard,

Chalco, Eagle Run, Bennington, Fontenelle).

Preceptors: NPs and PAs.

Prerequisites: None.

Preferred experience: None.

What to expect: You will see a variety of acute and chronic conditions ranging from coughs and colds to diabetes care to depression and anxiety. You will see 15 to 20 patients per day in combination with your preceptor. You will see procedures such as pap smears, I & D's, ear irrigations and fluorescein stains. You will improve your knowledge of differential diagnoses, treatment plans, charting and detailed physical exams. You will have the opportunity to interact with our patient-centered medical home (PCMH) team, including dieticians, pharmacists, social workers and behavioral health professionals.

Appropriate NP track: FNP, AGPCNP.

Gastroenterology (Division of Internal Medicine)

Shift: 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Environment: Outpatient clinic.

Preceptors: Multiple preceptors ensure students

experience a variety of GI cases.

Prerequisites: A prior rotation with Family Medicine

or Internal Medicine is recommended.

General Internal Medicine – Primary Care

Shift: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Varies with each preceptor, no weekends/holidays.

Environment: Clinic-based; includes some office procedures.

Preceptor: Typically one per rotation; although some clinics/preceptors may utilize colleagues to help students achieve required hours.

Prerequisites: GIM providers care for patients aged 19 and older. Patients often have multiple medical conditions such as hypertension, diabetes, heart disease, chronic lung disease and kidney disorders, or may present with undifferentiated symptoms that

require diagnostic evaluation. Students will encounter a diverse panel of adult patients, ranging from healthy young adults to medically complex older adults. Need a strong foundation of pathophysiology and pharmacology, proficient in taking patient history and completing physical exam.

Appropriate NP Tracks: AGPCNP, FNP.

Hematology/Oncology

Shift: Students typically divide their time between the ambulatory team (Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.) and the inpatient team (10 to 12 hour shifts).

Environment: Primarily clinic-based, with some office procedures. This rotation offers a community practice experience and may include some hospital rounding at Nebraska Medical Center, the Fred & Pamela Buffett Cancer Center | Kearney or local hospitals in Kearney.

Preceptors: Students may work with multiple preceptors or a team-based preceptor model. One team member is in charge of scheduling and preceptor assignments. Some procedural experience may be included.

Prerequisites: Students would benefit from having a good foundation in physical assessment and internal medicine is recommended. This rotation is best suited for students nearing the end of their schooling.

Hospital Medicine

The clinical rotation offers nurse practitioner students an immersive inpatient experience designed to build strong foundational skills essential for acute care practice.

Patient Conditions you may encounter during this rotation: We treat a wide range of clinical conditions as a primary service, ranging from decompensated cirrhosis to oncologic complications (solid tumor) to acute psychiatric conditions. Requires coordination with nursing, SW/CTN and consultant teams, with a high level of overall clinical autonomy.

Shift/Hours/Schedule:

Day shifts: 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., focus on clinical reasoning, complex multi-system disease management, multidisciplinary care planning and interpreting diagnostic results in real-time.

Night shifts: 9 p.m. to 7 a.m. During this dedicated week, students will focus on performing thorough history and physical exams, evaluating new admissions and developing differential diagnoses and initial management plans.

Each student will be scheduled into predetermined clinical shifts with APP preceptors to promote continuity of care with patients, exposure to patient populations and build rapport with the patient care team. There will be some flexibility with this scheduling approach, but students will ultimately need to make the necessary accommodations for the semester.

Feedback and Continuity: Most importantly, this clinical rotation provides an invaluable opportunity to receive robust feedback from clinical preceptors and experience the full continuum of the hospitalized patient – from initial patient assessment to daily management and discharge planning. Our goal is that students will gain advanced inpatient competencies, improved clinical confidence and a deeper understanding of the pace and demands of real-world hospital practice.

Appropriate NP Track(s): AGACNP.

Immediate Care Clinics (Division of Family Medicine)

Shifts: 1 to 10 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on weekends.

Experience: We are a branch of Family Medicine although our scope of practice is defined by the acute nature of the patients we see. Depending upon the location and hours a student could expect to work alongside multiple different practitioners.

Infectious Diseases

Shift: Primarily inpatient; some outpatient depending on assignment. Usually 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Environment: Inpatient units and ambulatory clinics at Nebraska Medical Center, Bellevue Medical Center and Specialty Care Center.

Preceptor: Team-based preceptor model with APRNs. Students may rotate through oncology, solid organ transplant, general medicine, ortho/community and HIV services.

Prerequisites: Students would benefit from having a good foundation in internal medicine and physical assessment. It is recommended this rotation be towards the middle to end of your schooling.

Appropriate NP Track: AGACNP, AGPCNP, FNP.

Inpatient Cardiology

Shifts: 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. clinic rotation Monday through Friday; 12-hour night shifts (7 p.m. to 7 a.m.) available.

Location: Nebraska Medical Center, Omaha.

Environment: This is inpatient rotation only. Patients have a variety of cardiology conditions and can rotate through the interventional/structural, adult congenital heart disease, electrophysiology and heart failure inpatient services.

Preceptors: Individual or team-based precepting.

Prerequisites: Hospital Medicine rotation.

Appropriate NP Track: AGACNP.

Neurosurgery Outpatient Clinic

Shifts: Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. No nights or weekends required. Limited time in surgery; most operating room experience is observational or shadowing-based.

Preceptors: The rotation is designed to help students develop skills in evaluating outpatient neurosurgery patients, forming differential diagnoses, determining appropriate workups and imaging, and interpreting tests to guide treatment plans and recommendations.

Prerequisites: Students should be proficient in conducting thorough histories and physicals, writing progress and follow-up notes, reviewing imaging and documentation in advance and coming prepared to discuss assigned neurosurgical topics. It's highly advised that a student who is applying for this rotation have a general interest in neurosurgery.

OB/GYN Women's Health

Shifts:

- Midwifery students: Varied clinical days and times during the week. Schedules may differ from week to week. No nights, weekends or inpatient experiences, except for certified nurse midwife (CNM) students.
- Nurse practitioners: Consistent weekday availability, though not every day of the week.

Locations: Students will routinely see patients at Durham Outpatient Center and Village Pointe Health Center locations and must be willing to rotate between both.

Pediatric Oncology

Shifts: Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Environment: This would be mostly inpatient,

with some clinic time.

Preceptor: One preceptor to one student.

Prerequisite: Pediatric NP students or PAs with a strong desire to do specialized pediatric care.

Radiation Oncology, Gynecologic Oncology, Head and Neck Surgery (Oncology)

Shift: Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Environment: Clinic-based.

Gynecologic Oncology: May include office procedures and opportunities to observe in the OR with physicians.

Prerequisites: Completion of women's health coursework prior to the rotation recommended.

Head and Neck Surgery: May include office procedures and opportunities to observe in the OR with physicians.

Prerequisites: This specialized rotation is best suited for APPs nearing the end of schooling.

Preferred prerequisites: Prior surgical rotations or experience are helpful but not required. Students should be willing to learn both during and outside the rotation and actively participate in case discussions on neurosurgical topics.

Rheumatology

Shift: Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Environment: Outpatient clinic. **Preceptors:** Physician faculty.

Experience: This rotation focuses on experiential learning in the ambulatory setting, coupled with didactic educational conferences. Students will be exposed to a broad range of rheumatic disease and work alongside multiple faculty members.

Surgical Oncology

Shift: Variable hours depending the area of focus.

Environment: Inpatient, outpatient clinic,

OR or a combination of settings.

Preceptors: One APP in charge of scheduling with the student and preceptor(s).

Prerequisite: This specialized rotation is best suited for students toward the end of their training. A strong physical assessment and internal medicine is highly beneficial.

Transplant Nephrology/Surgery

Shift: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. No nights or weekends expected with very little surgery time (more shadowing/observation in OR).

Environment: Inpatient service and outpatient surgical clinic.

Preceptors: Rotation scheduled to allow students to gain experience in evaluation of inpatient and outpatient transplant nephrology and surgical patients, understanding differential diagnoses, determining appropriate workup/imaging and interpretation of tests to dictate the most appropriate treatment plan/recommendations.

Prerequisites: We expect students to be able to complete an admission and thorough clinic H&P, progress notes/clinic follow-up, reviewing notes/imaging ahead of time, coming to rotations prepared to discuss transplant topics assigned and engaging with staff/other APPs.


